Special Book Offer: The Organs of York Minster 1236 - 2021

A new book by Dr Nicholas Thistlethwaite, President of BIOS, marks the restoration of the Minster's organ. The book documents the earliest reference to "a pair of organs" in 1236 and describes other instruments right through to the present day.

Farnborough Abbey Organ Appeal

I have received this email from resident organist at St Michael's Abbey, Farnborough, which I cannot do better but reproduce in full:

Dear friends,

My last email to you brought the sad news of the cancellation of our 2020 concert series due to the dreadful Covid crisis which has restricted everyone in so many ways this year. This time I write with good news. The Abbey community has managed to secure funds for a much-needed restoration of the instrument.

Let me explain this. More than twenty years have elapsed since the splendid work on the organ by Klais in 1998. This Klais work took place within the context of a restoration of the whole Abbey Church, a project which saw English Heritage and National Lottery collaborating on a scheme exceeding £1,000,000. Already at that time we foresaw that within decades other works would become necessary on the organ which, built in the 1880s, is understandably sensitive and fragile. The proposed restoration will begin in the next weeks and will be carried out by organ experts at Henry Willis.

We are about £15,000 short of the target.

Some of you who greatly appreciate the Abbey and its Cavaillé-Coll have asked to be notified if there are ways you can help further the cause of this exquisite instrument.

The link below is the easiest way to donate, **and every little helps**. We are profoundly grateful to those who have already donated to this project and have brought us so near to our target. Making good use of the closure of the Abbey Church to the public during 'lockdown', we hope to have the work completed by June of this coming year.

Sad News

It was a shock to learn of the death of former Organ Club member Catherine Ennis on Christmas Eve. Many members will have attended her fine recitals at St Lawrence Jewry, made all the more enjoyable by her introductions to the pieces beforehand.

There will be a full appreciation of Catherine, which we hope to publish in the next Organ Club Journal.

Last year, 2020, we also lost Jane Parker-Smith, Jean Guillou, and Jennifer Bate: in all a thoroughly bad year.

Further to the visit to Wembley Parish Church in November 2017

Committee member Leslie Bevis-Smith writes:

"Members who attended the visit to Wembley Parish Church in November 2017 may note that Bishop & Son have now been instructed to complete the works carried out about 10 years ago, especially relevant now as when taking the Swell out of the Ingram organ for reworking, found proof that the organ was installed exactly 100 years ago, in the shape of newspapers stuffed behind that chest dated February 1921!

We had planned to add a $1\frac{1}{3}$ ft stop to the choir organ (8,8,4,2,8), but when taking the organ out found that a hitherto inaccessible stained-glass window was in bad condition, requiring specialist repairs to both stonework and glass which effectively used up the sum allowed for this addition, although the console was prepared.

The TC clarinet will be transferred to a new unit chest and the new full compass stop planted in its place so that the flue chorus is entirely on its slider chest (separated only from the Gt by a passage board).

Leslie recalls an experience in Surrey many years ago when a flute was taken off a slider chest and placed on a unit chest and extended upwards to include a $2\frac{2}{3}$, and on returning a few years ago found that the unit chest stops were by then speaking out of phase with the slider chest ranks which really destroyed the chorus!"

2. CLUB MEETINGS

In the Pipeline

A week exploring organs, with some Victorian transport

The Isle of Man has much of interest. We will focus on seeing some of the organs in the some of the many churches and chapels on the island, but will also have the opportunity to experience Victorian rail travel and in the process see some splendid scenery in this essentially rural country.

The island is a Crown Protectorate with its own parliament, legal system and currency. As an independent state of fewer than 90,000 residents that recognises the Queen as 'Lord of Mann', it has never been a member of the EU.

Further details will be published nearer to the date.
