Restoration Appeal - the 1904 Walker Organ at Hatchlands Park

The 3-manual Walker organ of 1904 at Hatchlands Park is a unique instrument in original condition and rightly deserves its BIOS Grade 1 certificate. It has had little work since installation and now needs a deep clean and careful restoration of pipes and action. A fund-raising appeal has so far raised £20,000 but considerably more is needed to undertake the essential work. Club members will doubtlessly remember the club visit in September 2018 and the Trust is grateful for the contribution made to the fund at that visit. The organ is the only instrument in the house that is in the care of The National Trust. The Trust believes that it should be played for the enjoyment of visitors as well as being maintained as an important instrument, so the restoration will enable a regular programme of recitals to be given as well as providing an opportunity for visiting organists to play and to demonstrate to visitors when the Music Room is open.
