1. NOTICES

We are looking forward to our first live visit for $1\frac{1}{2}$ years, to Canterbury, on Saturday September 25^{th} 2021. This is an exciting opportunity to see, hear and play a large new organ by Harrison & Harrison Ltd, based on the Father Willis pipework. You can whet your appetite by viewing some interesting video clips of the restoration – just Google "YouTube New Organ Installed – Canterbury Cathedral".

For the safety of all, we are asking that only members who have been doubly vaccinated (with the 2nd dose administered at least 3 weeks before the visit, i.e. on or before 4th September), should register to attend.

It will be necessary to pre-book for this event, as 'Test & Trace' is likely to continue even after other restrictions are lifted.

We also ask that members should pay for visits by bank transfer before the visit if possible. As an added precaution, the club is planning to acquire a portable bank card reader for those who wish to pay on the day, in order to avoid the handling of notes and coins, so please come armed with a bank debit or credit card. Details will be given in the September newsletter.

For your safety, we would like to operate these measures for subsequent visits, whilst the Covid pandemic is still with us.

We are very much looking forward to seeing you at Canterbury - our President, Paul Hale, has a message for all members concerning this visit, below.

Willis organ, and to be the guests of the newly appointed Director of Music, Dr David Newsholme.



David just happens to be my godson. His father Richard, now a retired GP, learned the organ at Solihull School at the same time as I did - just ahead of John Butt, David Briggs, Iain Simcock and Laurence Cummings (some innings!). David has generously invited us to observe the pre-Evensong cathedral choir rehearsal,

attend Evensong, and then get locked into the cathedral, where he will tell us all about the organ and demonstrate it for us, before letting us loose to play.

Earlier in the day, we will meet at St Paul's church (a short walk from Canterbury East station) at around 10.30a.m., have coffee there, and then explore the organ, guided by the church's organist, David Rees-Williams. As many Members may know, the David Rees-Williams Trio has a stellar reputation, with many fine jazz recordings.

David was a chorister at New College Oxford in my time as Organ Scholar, and specialises in improvising on many of the fine choral works which he learnt as a chorister. I have asked him whether he would improvise for us on the piano in the church and he has said he'd be delighted to do that.

After St Paul's we will walk along the line of the City Walls towards the cathedral, taking lunch in the well-known and popular *Old Buttermarket*, close to the cathedral. We have been able to book all 60 seats here (for 12:30). Club Members will settle their own bills and the restaurant has asked us to send out menus and ask for choices in advance of the visit. When you receive the menu, please send your menu choices to John Henderson as soon as possible, but no later than September 17th, using contact information that will be supplied with the menu.

We then walk around the corner to the cathedral, where we are booked on to a guided tour specially for us, at 2pm. A light tea is arranged at the cathedral for 3.30pm, followed by choir rehearsal at 4.30, Evensong at 5.30, and then our organ evening, starting once Evensong is over and the cathedral is clear.

Your travel could be by car or train. I'd recommend the latter – book for **Canterbury East**. The cathedral has to charge us for our evening event, for it

could be raising far more money by hosting a concert that night. It has kindly thrown in, free of charge, entry to the cathedral and the guided tour, but we will need to offer David Newsholme a fee.

Members will pay the restaurants for their lunches. There will therefore be a per capita charge of £40, to cover the cathedral's facility fee, David's fee, a donation to St Paul's and tea at the cathedral. We are saving around £18 by not being charged for entrance to the cathedral or the guided tour, so it's really excellent value for such a splendid event.

Alison Garratt is our Canterbury Member who has worked with me in arranging this special day - many thanks to Alison for doing the leg work.

I'm delighted that 56 members have already booked to join me at Canterbury on September 25th. There are only <u>four places left</u>, so if you'd like to be there, please email John Henderson at <u>treasurer@organclub.org</u> immediately. The treasurer will then be in touch to confirm bookings, payment arrangements, and menus (choices to John by September 17th please).

Saturday October 16th 2021: Cirencester

11:00 Arrive All Saints Church, Down Ampney Depart 12:00 Down Ampney is most famous as being associated with Ralph Vaughan Williams, born in the vicarage on 12 October 1872 The organ was built in 1874 by J W Walker, 1 manual (enclosed) 8 stops + pedal Bourdon.

12:20 Arrive St John Cirencester

Depart by 15:30

St John's is the largest parish church in Gloucestershire and one of the most spacious. In 2009 the organ was completely rebuilt by Harrison and Harrison, and is a large 4 manual organ, 63 stops, retaining the Scott case and incorporating some 30 surviving Willis stops.

On arrival, there will be time for members to look around the church and to visit a very good bookshop/CD store just inside the church.

At 13:00, the Organist & Choirmaster, Hugo Kennard, will demonstrate the organ, after which members may play.

The church was designed and built by Sir Gilbert Scott in 1851. An organ by Bishop & Starr, was installed in 1867, and in 1963, Percy Daniel carried out a major restoration, followed by a restoration in 1999 – the organ has 3 manuals & pedals, with 29 stops.

16:45 Arrive Holy Rood, Ampney Crucis

Depart by 17:45

The church is a mixture of styles – it has all periods from Saxon to c19, much is in the perpendicular style. The origin of the organ is uncertain, but in 1984 it was cleaned and overhauled by John Bleney, and was fully rebuilt and restored in 2019 by Ross Daly of Worcester. The organ has 2 manuals & pedals, with 13 stops.

18:30 Arrive Swindon Station - depart 18:41; arrive PAD 19:37 platform 5.
