Organ Club Centenary Celebrations - 2026

<u>Leslie Bevis-Smith</u> writes regarding the Centenary preparation:

About 50 years ago I was asked by the late Colin Gouldon to prepare designs for the graphic styling of the Organ Club Golden Jubilee. The main thrust of the brief then was that the image of the St Paul's organ case had to be prominent, being the Organ Club logo. My work was based around this but starting from scratch, with the objective to put the organ case into its architectural surrounding. The sketch has seemed to work quite well and is in still in use (it was even used as a greeting card by the St Paul's Cathedral School some years ago). The rest of the work then were the supporting graphics and LP cover, handbook design & etc. As was usual in the pre-digital '70s, 'Letraset' was the usual supporting technique. It would be an immense understatement to say things have changed, and I certainly do not have the technical skills to carry this forward!

50 years on, we strongly feel that a New Look for the visual presentation of the Organ Club is really needed - in modern language, '**Rebranding**'. Gone will be the lettering styles previously used as well as the more decorative style introduced later and currently used on the website, and a new modern - Young & Fresh - style introduced. Consideration will be given to the '**strapline**' (sub-heading). While major changes are made for the centenary graphics, how these should be carried forward in subsequent years is another matter to address.

The Centenary Committee is clear we should look to the membership as a whole for a member with graphic design skills to come forward to help us explore the direction that this can take, also bearing in mind that our website will be another critical element in our move forward.

We would be really happy to hear from a club member/s who feels they might be able to help us. A full briefing will emerge from initial discussions. In the first instance, President Paul Hale would be most pleased to hear from anyone happy to talk about their possible involvement. LBS

Saturday May 20th 2023: Hastings, East Sussex

Eric Shepherd writes:

As one of the churches for the proposed Newbury visit was unavailable, I am arranging a visit to Hastings, East Sussex.

We start at the large Anglo Catholic Church of Christ Church, Silchester Road, St Leonards on Sea, East Sussex at 11am. The organ is a large 3 manual originally built by Holdich in 1882, rebuilt by Norman & Beard in 1902, and rebuilt at the west end of the church by Willis in 1930.

After an extended lunch break, and time to get to the lovely Old Town area of Hastings, we hope to visit another church, details to be confirmed, after which we visit the 3 manual 25 stop organ by Father Willis built in 1878, at All Saints Church at 4pm, where tea will be provided. This organ was cleaned and overhauled by B C Shepherd & Sons in 2021. The church has had a well-attended summer series of organ recitals for many years with recitals by well-known organists. It is many years since the Club visited Hastings.

We hope to rearrange the Newbury visit in August.

Saturday June 17th 2023: walking tour - "Lower" Windsor parish churches. (Organised by Mark Jameson)

This is arranged as a walking visit around the lower part of the town, away from the main tourist areas. Draft notes have been prepared and will be available ahead of the visit in electronic format. Printed notes will be in A5 booklet format.

10:30 All Saints Church, Francis Road. 1931 Hunter – last seen by the Club in 1931. Great 10, Swell 8, Pedal 4 stops.

11:45 Holy Trinity Garrison Church, Trinity Place. c1926 Conacher, rebuilt 1984 Rushworth & Dreaper, repaired in 1994 by John Budgen. Choir 5, Swell 10, Great 10, Pedal 5

14:00 St Edward RC, Dorset Road. c1867 Bevington, rebuilt and altered 1977 by Bowen Organs, and looked after by B C Shepherd & Sons. Great 8, Swell 7, Pedal 5.

Very limited parking at back of church, leave car at East Berkshire College Car Park for the first three churches [public parking on Saturdays]. **15:00 St Stephen & St Agnes, Clewer**. Walker, by 1894, 2013 Peter Collins, work not finished, but completed 2021 by Principal Pipe Organs; Great 11, Swell 11, Pedal 4.

Car parking here for this church - please book when booking visit. John Halsey, the Director of Music for All Saints and Holy Trinity has helped me organise this day. Saturday July 15th 2023: Goring-on-Thames

16:45 St Thomas Goring – Paul Hale was the advisor here and the newly rebuilt organ by Clevedon Organs was opened with a recital by Thomas Trotter on 11th February. Paul's recital was postponed due to illness but to be rescheduled. Paul will give a talk about this instrument at the start of this visit.

September 13th - 19th 2023: Birmingham tour

The President writes:

I am delighted to be able warmly to invite as many members as possible to join me in Birmingham - England's Second City - for the Club's tour on <u>September 13th (early afternoon) to 19th (ends after breakfast).</u> John Varney and I grew up and played organs in the area in the late 1960s and we both recall the range of fine instruments contained in and around the City, along with the organists who were so welcoming to young players. I am really pleased to tell you that all venues to whom we wrote, requesting the chance to play the organ, replied in the affirmative. Arranging a day and time at Symphony Hall and the Town Hall was the biggest challenge, but in mid-February the email reached me telling me we'd got both Halls and organs booked.

At that point it seemed clear to me that the Tour was feasible - as long as we attract sufficient Club members (and partners, of course) to spread the overheads affordably. The cost payable to the Club by each attendee will cover a fee to each of the 18 venues, a masterclass with Daniel Moult on the new Flentrop at the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire, a special dinner with invited guests, one day's coach hire, plus incidental costs. A budget is being drawn up at this moment. We will be based at the Premier Inn at New Street Station and attendees will

make their own booking with the hotel and their own arrangements for meals except for the special dinner on the Friday evening, also their own bus fares on the day which takes us to Wolverhampton and Walsall and on the day that takes us to three organs in the Sutton Coldfield area.

Just to tempt you into putting the dates firmly in your diaries, look up these organs on the NPOR and you'll see why John and I are so excited about sharing our knowledge of these instruments with our friends in the Club: St Philip's Cathedral, St Chad's Cathedral, Symphony Hall, Town Hall, St Martin in the Bull Ring, St Paul's church (Jewellery Quarter), Royal Birmingham Conservatoire [new organ not yet on NPOR], Carrs Lane Chapel, St Alban & St Patrick church, Solihull School Chapel, St Alphege Solihull, St Margaret's Olton [large rebuilt organ not yet on NPOR, but do look at this: <u>https://paulhale.org/wp-content/uploads/2021/09/booklet-olton.pdf</u>], St Peter's Collegiate Church Wolverhampton, Walsall Town Hall, St Matthew Walsall, Emmanuel Wylde Green, St Peter Many [NPOR out of date] and Erdington Abbey [NPOR again out of date].

On the morning of the 19th September, there is an optional extra visit to St. Michael's Church, Boldmere, Sutton Coldfield, 10.30 am till 12 noon, to see the fine 1962 II/32 'Coventry type' Harrison & Harrison organ.

We will also be visiting the Science Museum (now called 'Thinktank' in its new building near the RBC), walking through the Bull Ring and past the stunning new Central Library, though sadly the beautiful Art Gallery with its sumptuous Pre-Raphaelite holdings will still be closed for renovation. Signs of HS2 will be evident near the RBC, for its Birmingham station will be at Curzon Street - revitalising the original 1838 Curzon Street Station, the terminus of the original line from Euston Station. The appearance of the building mirrored that of the long-lost and much-lamented Euston Arch at the other end of the line, both the designs of Philip Hardwick (1792-1870). Members may remember that the RCO almost moved there when our Vice President Dr Roy Massey MBE was RCO President, but alas the plans eventually came to nothing.

What I need at this stage is <u>an expression of firm interest</u>, not necessarily an out and out commitment (thought the latter would of course be really helpful!).

Could you please email me at <u>PaulHale@diaphone.clara.net</u> once you have had a look at the New Street Premier Inn charges, worked out what your meal costs might be for the 5.5 days (6 nights, or 5 nights if you leave midevening after the last organ visit on Monday 18th) we are there, and have decided that if the additional amount payable to the Club is not too large you could afford the Tour and would be interested in putting your name[s] down provisionally. The need for these provisional names is so that I can work out a per capita cost based on numbers, after which we should be able to let you all know the approximate Tour charge (should be less than £200, depending on number of attendees).

<u>A reply by Easter Day</u> would help me to progress the budget and thus let everyone know (a) the Tour charge and (b) whether it will definitely go ahead [that depends on a minimum number of 20, I feel].

I eagerly look forward to hearing from a whole host of Club Members - this is a chance not to be missed to play some amazing organs and experience a vibrant city, full of interesting buildings and culture.

Some of the 3,500 pipes of this fine organ are over 300 years old. Since Henry Purcell gave the opening recital in 1684, the instrument has been enlarged and enriched by a succession of leading organ builders, and it was last restored in 2010 by Nicholsons of Malvern. Organists of the church have included the 18th century composer William Boyce (here for 32 years), as well as Harold Darke (50 years) and Richard Popplewell. The [Royal] College of Organists was founded here in the 19th century. The weekly recitals series is thought to be the longest-running in the world (it began in 1914). It features performances by our two resident organists (Jonathan Rennert and Makoto James), as well as guest recitalists from the UK and overseas.

The continuation of these recitals depends on the generosity of the audience. As you leave, you will see a bowl for cash donations, as well as a card-reader (for debit or credit cards) and a QR code on display.
