We visit the small City of Ely with one of the very largest and most magnificent Cathedrals in the country, which was last visited by the Club in 1976. We start with a short visit to the small church of St Peter's, then after lunch, go to hear the impressive new organ in St Andrew's Soham, before returning to Ely for a RSCM Festival service, and then a demonstration of the large Harrison organ.

1100 St Peter's Church, Broad Street, Ely CB7 4AH

Unaltered 1 manual Hill organ built 1891, 7 stops.

1200 Lunch break in Ely.

1330 Members with cars to take other members to Soham, with other members going by taxi, which will need to be booked in advance. Please let me know if you require a lift or need a taxi. This is to avoid the cost of a coach for the one visit.

1400 St Andrew's Church, Fountain Lane, Soham CB7 5ED

New 2 manual 28 stop organ by Richard Bower 2013, incorporating some Forster & Andrews pipes from former organ.

1530 Cars back to Ely. Time to get tea in the town.

Ely Cathedral, Chapter House, The College, The Gallery CB7 4DL

Harrison & Harrison organ 1908, incorporating Hill pipes from former organ. Rebuilt Harrison & Harrison and drastically altered 1975, and 2001, when a number of the tonal alterations carried out in 1975 were reversed. 4 manuals 80 stops.

1700 RSCM Ely Festival of Church Music service in place of Evensong

Directed by Paul Trepte (Organist & Director of Music), Edmund Aldhouse (Assistant Organist). Make sure that you arrive in good time for the service, as it will be well attended.

Following this the Assistant Organist, Edmund Aldhouse, will demonstrate the organ, after which members will be able to play until **2030**.

Charge: the meeting charge is $\pounds 5$. If members share a taxi this is at their own expense.

Travel: trains to Ely go from Kings Cross. The approximate journey time is 1 hour 15 minutes. It takes about 10 minutes to walk to St Peter's Church from Ely Station.

SATURDAY 16 JUNE - WINCHESTER

We last visited the lovely City of Winchester in 1990, when we went to St Cross Hospital, Winchester College, and the Cathedral. Unfortunately we are unable to visit the College because of a big open day, but we are visiting the small historic church of St Lawrence, near the Cathedral after lunch. We start at the magnificent Hospital of St Cross, which is "England's Most Perfect Almshouse" (*Simon Jenkins*) with a large Norman chapel which is like a small abbey. We finish with one of the finest and largest cathedrals in the country.

St Cross Hospital is a mile outside the centre of the city. The most picturesque way to approach it is across the water meadows from the Cathedral, but it can be approached by road, which is just over a mile from the city centre.

1100 Hospital of St Cross and Almshouse of Noble Poverty, St Cross Road, Winchester SO23 9SD

Please allow time to pay the admission charge (£5). Visitors can ask for the Wayfarers' Dole of bread and ale as they depart, which is a unique ancient custom.

The very fine organ is by Walker (1863, 1902 & 1907). 3 manuals 27 stops.

1230 approx Walk across water meadows to centre of Winchester (1 mile). **Lunch break**

1500 St Lawrence's Church, 18-19 The Square, Winchester S023 9EX

2 manual 19 stop organ by Osmond of Taunton 1966; major restoration by Griffiths & Company of Portsmouth 2017.

1600 time to get tea.

1730 Winchester Cathedral, 9 The Close S023 9LS

Organ originally by Willis 1851 built for Great Exhibition, installed at the Cathedral in 1854, rebuilt by Willis 1897, rebuilt and enlarged Hele of Plymouth 1905. Rebuilt by Harrison & Harrison in 1933, and 1989. 4 manuals 79 stops.

Choral Evensong: please get there in good time, as seating in the Quire is limited.

After Evensong, the Organist & Master of the Choristers, Andrew Lumsden, will demonstrate the organ, and there will be time for some members to play.
